Social (Media) Suicide and other ideations

Just got home from a trip to Portland, Oregon with a college friend. She introduced me to her friend Lizzie, whom she met when she was living there. While getting to know each other, Lizzie asked me my sign. "What is this, the 70's?" I asked. She laughed and really wanted to know, so I told her I was a Scorpio. She asked me if I was an addict. I was stunned! "Umm, no, why do you ask?" She says everyone she meets who's a Scorpio has addiction problems. I brushed this out of my mind and didn't think of it till I flew home and reviewed this crazy conversation. I concluded that she's somewhat perceptive. No, I've never been an alcoholic, nor on illicit drugs or mushrooms, but I used to be addicted to social media. Yes, I admit, I was a regular Facebooker, Instagrammer, a Twit on Twitter (or X since it has been renamed by "he who must not be named.") I realized I needed a break from social media when friends were posting photos of their Dunkin Donuts drinks. I deleted all my accounts in 2017. Then, as an addict does, I reactivated my Facebook briefly in 2020 to see who was alive and then went off again. Since I've been off, my mood has improved, I don't feel the pull to answer every noise my phone makes or to waste my days looking at memes, cute puppies, or someone's food they're eating at the moment. At the time of deletion, I asked myself why I had been so addicted to social media and wondered if there had been anything written about social media being an addiction? According to a new study by Harvard University, self-disclosure on social networking sites lights up the same part of the brain that also ignites when taking an addictive substance. The reward area in the brain and its chemical messenger pathways affect decisions and sensations.

Jaron Lanier, a Silicon Valley pioneer who is the father of Virtual Reality wrote a book called: Ten Arguments For Deleting Your Social Media Accounts Right Now explains why you should quit social media today in order to feel healthier, happier, and more at peace. Here are his ten reasons in a nutshell:

- 1. Takes away your free will.
- 2. Contributes to the insanity of our world.
- 3. Turns you into a jerk.
- 4. Manipulates truth.
- 5. Is destroying the meaning of everything you say.
- 6. Annihilates your ability to be empathetic.
- 7. Makes you miserable.
- 8. Takes away your economic dignity.
- 9. Is the reason why politics are so awful and impossible.
- 10. Hates you.

Social media use becomes problematic when someone views it as an important coping mechanism to relieve stress, loneliness, or depression. Social media use provides these individuals with continuous rewards that they're not receiving in real life, so they end up engaging in the activity more and more. When people get addicted to "likes" or encounter online bullies, it can push someone over the edge. It is best to limit or delete our social media use, as it serves little benefit to us in the long run.

3. Household Hazardous Waste

Naperville has a household hazardous waste facility for specific items that we cannot put in the trash and not acceptable at other offsite recycling locations. This facility is located at 156 Fort Hill Drive in Naperville and only open on Saturday and Sunday from 9am to 2pm. It is available to all residents of Illinois and is free of charge. Please visit the link for items acceptable at this location.

Just as a simple reminder, our <u>curbside</u> recycling bins can only accept specific items. Click on the link for what can and cannot go into your bins.

One last plug- remember to BYOB (bring your own BAG) to the store when shopping. As you know, single use plastic bags are detrimental to our environment.

Beginning Tuesday, August 1, 2023, Monday-Friday, 9 AM-4 PM Lisle Township will be accepting the following items for recycling:



How Will It Work?

- 1. Need more information: visit Lisletownship.com/recycling or call 630-968-2087.
- 2. We ask that you come into the office and speak with the receptionist before bringing the items into the office if they are more than 15 pounds. The receptionist will process it at 4711 Indiana Ave., Lisle. If it is a TV or Monitor, there will be a small fee to recycle it. Pay ahead of time or with a credit card. \$25 for 21 inches. Over 21 inches is \$35. Payment can be made in advance at http://recycling.eworksesi.org/. All other electronics are accepted at no charge. For larger pieces, check in with the receptionist but leave the piece in your vehicle. The receptionist will direct you accordingly.
- 3. If it is a textile, please bag it prior to your arrival. Textiles include sheets, blankets, pairs of shoes (tied together) used clothing. Please only donate clean items.

eWorks

- Flectronics fees for televisions and monitors
- · Textiles clothes, shoes, belts, purses, towels, sheets, -everything must be in plastic bags - please no clothes with motor oil, oil-based paints, stains or gasoline
- Scrap metal no engines, no motor oil containers

Recycling options will include:

SCARCE

- Books paperback, novels, kids, reference, and textbooks
- Musical instruments wind instruments (trumpets, flutes, etc.); string instruments (violins, guitars, etc.) no drums, pianos, or keyboards
- School supplies new (no glue, paints, aerosol cans)
- Office supplies new
- Puzzles please put the pieces in a zip lock (so pieces won't fall out of the box).
- · Bread tags please, no twist ties.
- Liquid vegetable cooking oil olive oil, canola oil, and peanut oil must be in a container with a secure cap.

DuPage County has partnered with eWorks and RewearAble to collect clothing and textiles for reuse and recycling. Items not able o be reused will be turned into cleaning/painting rags or reused in insulation, packing material, and carpeting. RewearAble is. a non-profit that provides sustainable employment for adults with disabilities. Acceptable items: clothing, shoes, sheets, bedding, owels, and other household textiles in any condition. No heavily soiled items. Shoes must be matched and tied together. Items must be bagged in plastic bags.

ELECTRONICS

This electronic site will be collecting the following items: computers, laptops, servers, computer monitors, televisions, printers, acsimiles, scanners, VCR & DVD players, video game consoles, and cell phones, along with other electronics and small household appliances, as specified on the full list. Appliances with refrigerants and all other items not listed cannot be accepted. The fee applies to TVs and Monitors. A coupon and 501c3 tax receipt are provided upon payment at the site. Payment can be made in advance at recycling.eworksesi.org/. All other electronics are accepted at no charge.
